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## Youth Commission Will Install Phase One of Playground in Spring

“We’ve raised enough money for Phase One of our new playground,” reports Ruth Wittlinger, president, Ancram Youth Commission. “We’ll install that next spring, and then decide if and what we want to add to the site.” Possibilities include a shaded seating area for parents and more play equipment.

Fund-raising efforts this year have amounted to more than \$52,000, plus the group has filed for a \$25,000 grant from New York State Parks and Recreation. Received and committed funds now put the playground at 50% of the financial goal.

“We were especially pleased by the results of our fund-raising letter last summer,” Ruth says. “We received amounts of every size—the average was \$100—and what that says is that many people in our town want safe, fun places for our kids to play.”

“Thank you to everyone who contributed,” she adds. “Now, please share your great ideas to help us figure out how to get the money needed to finish this project! We need your input.”

## 2011 Budget: Taxes Flat, Reserves High *by Town Supervisor Art Bassin*

2011 revenues and expenses are budgeted at about \$1.4 million. Property taxes will be \$927,000, just under 2010. We will start 2011 with about \$650,000 in the bank, a stronger cushion than most neighboring towns. Some people ask how can we keep taxes flat when costs go up and while building a new garage—how can we pay for this without raising taxes?

**Priorities, discipline and common sense.** The Town Board has been watching costs since last January, and we've made reductions already. Department heads were asked to cut back, only spend what was essential, and they did. For 2011, we *will not* raise taxes. We will look at priorities and find ways to *do things differently* to save money. For example:

**Pay back our loan through spending cuts.** The \$400,000 garage loan for the garage expansion and renovation has a 10-year term with a 2.99% interest rate, and we can prepay without penalty. The 2011 budget assumes we will repay over a 5-year term, at \$80,000 a year, plus interest. This will cost us \$92,000 in 2011. Three-quarters of this will come from savings in the highway department, and the rest from reduced spending for the rescue squad, building costs, electric costs, and legal services.

**Limited salary increases and less costly health care programs.** Compensation for the supervisor, the four town councilmen, two judges, the assessor, and building inspector/ZEO stay flat. Increases for some positions are budgeted to better align pay with experience, and comparisons with other towns. We expanded the hours worked by our town clerk by 33%, and have adjusted her compensation to reflect this. Raises are budgeted for the highway superintendent (\$3,000), the highway department, and for some of the more experienced town hall staff. We will change the employee health insurance plan to a high-deductible plan to keep health insurance costs flat, with no change in out-of-pocket costs for employees. Without this change, costs would increase \$15,000.

**Spend less, do more, stay flexible.** The Town Board will continue to look for better, less costly ways to do the town's routine business. We will also investigate things we are *not* doing that need to be done, which may cost us money. But whatever we do, it will be within a framework of holding property taxes flat and maintaining high levels of reserves, so we can deal with anything unexpected that comes along.

You can buy note cards at Ancram Town Hall (from the town clerk on Wednesday and Saturday mornings), the Ancramdale Post Office, the Farmer's Wife, and before monthly Town Board meetings.

**Cell Tower Law Passes**

At the October Town Board meeting, the board adopted a new cell tower law that supports expanding cell service in Ancram, Ancramdale, and Boston Corner. Bob Roth, chair of the Cell Tower Committee, reports AT&T is actively looking for sites and hopes to have a cell tower installed within 18 months.

**Voters Extend Terms For Town Clerk and Highway Superintendent**

In 2011, the jobs of Ancram town clerk/tax collector and highway superintendent will be up for election for four-year terms instead of two years. In the November election, town voters approved propositions to extend these terms of office.
